SN.	PROJECT	ACTIVITIES
1	NIITE	Year 2 refresher trainings will be held in three pilot districts; Surkhet, Nawalparasi and Jhapa. The training in Surkhet is being conducted from 27 Nov to 1 Dec and in December in Nawalparasi and Jhapa. Altogether 119 teachers will participate from the three districts.
2	сс	Training of core skills will be delivered in Rupandehi and Nawalparasi on 25th 26th and 27th November. In total 40 participants will participate from these districts. Simultaneously, two enabling courses will also be delivered to school leaders in these districts.

MEET A TRAINER



1. What do you enjoy most when delivering training for the different projects – EDGE, CC and NIITE? How are they different?

Well, I enjoy a lot of things when delivering trainings for EDGE, CC and NIITE. EDGE has a lot of enjoyable stuff. The enthusiasm of the young peer leaders gives me energy to sing and jump along with them. It feels really good when these young country girls consider us trainers to be their role model and aim to do something worthy in their life and not just stay at home and marry off.

I haven't done much CC. It basically teaches about making yourself and your students more competent and globally aware citizens. Participants taking this training learn lots of essential skills which are not only necessary for their students but for themselves as well. These participants are willing learners having strong aim to bring some changes in their community.

NIITE is basically about using English in the classroom which is a demand of the time. There is a wide range in the age of participants, Yet, all participate with a lot of willingness because of the enjoyable training package.

2. What do you think are your biggest strengths as a trainer?

My strengths as a trainer are that I constantly reflect on my teaching practice and look for ways to improve myself. I am calm and always flexible and willing to try new things

3. What about your weakness? How do you plan to overcome them?

As far as weaknesses are concerned, I am not fast in my work like while making plans (I can be steady though). This can sometimes be quite troublesome especially when I have to deliver training immediately.To overcome this, I set time limits, keep my used session plans and materials safe and check if they can be reused.

Many of my colleagues may not know that I started my teaching career as a Pre School Nursery Teacher. I have the experience of teaching from Nursery to Bachelors Level, working as a Teacher Trainer and IELTS Instructor. So, I strongly disagree when people say that there is very little career growth in teaching.

- 1. Write down short and simple instructions in your lesson plan and rehearse your instructions
- 2. Use effective Instruction Checking Questions (ICQ's)
- 3. Set tasks and stand back so that the teachers / students are doing the talking.
